

THREE GREAT APPEALS OF HEAVEN

The moral laws of God are laughed at and disdained by millions who deny His very existence, and who rebuff the measureless power able to discern the one fallen sparrow among the millions remaining in flight. The godless heap mounds of ridicule upon those who walk in, and who would have others walk in, the beauty of holiness. It shall not so be in heaven. *"And there shall in no wise enter into it any thing that defileth, neither whatsoever worketh abomination, or maketh a lie: but they which are written in the Lamb's book of life"* (Rev. 21:27).
